For once, however, the general market refused to be impressed by news which it had expected and already "discounted."

Foreign exchange resumed its upward movement, sterling getting within a fraction of the year's high prices, which was touched last Wednesday and Italian rates going to the highest of 1921. The advance was doubtless influenced by the more hopeful reports regarding the English coal strike, but it again gave more suggestion of resumption of a parmal recovery after an accidental interruption. The Bank of England's action on its official discount rate temorrow was awaited with great interest.


