

### Sons of Georgia Planter Held on Murder Charges

Grand Jury Returns Indictments in Connection With The Slaying of 14 Negroes.

Monticello, Ga., April 11.—Indictments were returned here by the Jasper county grand jury against John S. Williams, his three sons, Huland, Marvin and LeRoy, and Clyde Manning, his negro farm boss, charging murder in connection with the deaths of 14 negroes on the Williams plantation.

Eight indictments were found against John S. Williams, charging murder of eight farm hands. Eight indictments also were returned against Clyde Manning for the same killings.

Huland Williams was indicted for the killing of a negro named "Blackstrap."

One joint indictment was returned against Marvin and LeRoy Williams charging them with the murder of a negro known as "Iron Jaw" and Marvin Williams was indicted also for the murder of a negro named John Singleton.

The jury will continue tomorrow investigation of the alleged lynching of Eugene Hamilton.

John S. Williams was convicted of the murder of one of the negroes in Newton county last week and sentenced to life imprisonment.

### Divorce Granted Wife Of Man Who Vanished



Mrs. Grace A. Rife was granted a divorce yesterday afternoon from Claude Rife who disappeared two weeks ago, leaving notes stating that he was going to commit suicide.

Mrs. Rife, at the time of the disappearance, stated that she knew he had not killed himself. "He hasn't the nerve," she said.

Rife's attorney entered an objection to the divorce on the ground that Rife "is out of the city."

Mrs. Rife testified that her husband was drunk very frequently. A. M. Post, realtor, testified that he had seen Rife act in ungentlemanly manner, use intoxicating liquor and speak profanely.

Mrs. Rife was granted judgment for \$50 a month alimony.

### Future Status Of Pershing is Fixed by Harding

Secretary Weeks and President Keep Discussion Secret—Continuation as General Expected.

Chicago Tribune-Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Washington, April 11.—General Pershing's future status has been decided upon by President Harding and Secretary of War Weeks, but their decision is still a secret.

Secretary Weeks said today that announcement probably would be made within a few days.

Reports are current in military quarters, however, that General Pershing's new post will be one commensurate with his rank as the only general of the United States army and that he will serve as in supreme command of the army of peace, just as he served as the supreme commander of the army in the field during the war.

The general of the army has no defined duties in times of peace. It is understood, therefore, that the president and secretary of war have determined to ask congress for legislation defining duties for a general of the army in times of peace. Such duties would make the general of the army in supreme command, but they would not disturb the present organization which calls for a chief of staff. The chief of staff, who would continue to function as he now does, would, under the proposed plan, serve under the general of the army and General Pershing would,

therefore, be continued in his high post of supremacy as the highest ranking officer of the American military forces.

### Iowa Lodge A. O. U. W. May Be Enjoined From Business in Nebraska

Lincoln, April 11.—(Special.)—The grand lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of Iowa may be enjoined from transacting a fraternal insurance business in Nebraska in that name, the Nebraska supreme court holds in an opinion today.

The court finds, however, that the Iowa lodge may be licensed to do business by the state insurance department when such use of the name does not result in injury to the Nebraska order.

Although the Iowa lodge may be enjoined from soliciting or accepting new members, the high court rules that the order is not to interfere with existing contracts, or interfere with subordinate lodges as their membership now stands.

For this purpose the judgment of the lower court of Douglas county is reversed and the case is remanded for trial.

### Movie Censorship Defeated

St. Paul, April 11.—Proposals for motion picture censorship legislation were defeated today when the Minnesota house returned censorship measures to their authors.

### Bank at Pleasanton Taken Over by Trade And Commerce Board

Kearney, Neb., April 11.—(Special Telegram.)—The department of

trade and commerce has taken over the Farmers State bank of Pleasanton, Neb.

The bank has been operating under supervision of the department for the past four months. Cause of the department's action was excessive loan depletion of reserve and indifferent and inefficient management, according to a member con-

necting with the department. Loss to the depositors' guarantee fund will be small, it is stated.

Kearney parties are arranging to organize a new bank at Pleasanton and will, in all probability, purchase the assets of the Farmers State bank and resume operation in the near future.

Deposits of the bank are placed at

approximately \$135,000, while total assets are about \$100,000. Present officers are Ludwig Mueller, president, and Fred Mueller, cashier. The bank was organized in 1909.

It was learned at noon today that parties were effecting a reorganization of the bank.
