

### Revenue Bill is Advanced With Many Changes

Democrats Attempt to Obtain Income Tax Provision—Scored for in One Ward Consistencies.

Lincoln, April 15.—(Special Telegram.)—The lower house of the Nebraska legislature stood like a stone wall today behind the committee amendments to senate file 65, which eliminated the tax on intangibles, average capital, franchise, municipal bond, railroad and sleeping car taxes.

Every amendment was adopted by the house and when adjournment time arrived the members were ready for a motion advancing the deleted tax bill to third reading.

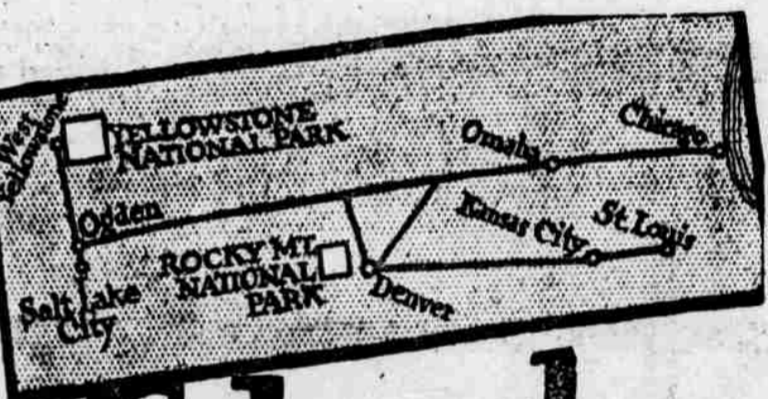
