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Labor Unions Are Bitterly Scored by U. S. Steel Head

Chairman Gary Favors "Reasonable Control" of Business Through Government Agencies.

New York, April 18.—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, told the stockholders at their annual meeting today he was in favor of "publicity, regulation and reasonable control" of business through government agencies...

Continuing his suggestion, he said: "Laws—clear, well defined, practical and easy of comprehension—covering these matters might be passed, and if so, they should apply to all economic organizations, groups or bodies exceeding certain specified numbers or amounts."

Mr. Gary devoted a considerable portion of his address to labor unions and said that the national and certain state labor unionism as expressed by the three words: "Inefficiency, high costs."

Mr. Gary said: "It seems to me," he said, "that the material, if not the necessary, results of the contemplated progress of labor unions, if successful, would be the control of shops, then of the general management of the business, then of capital and finally the government."

Mr. Gary said: "The officers of this corporation, the presidents of subsidiary companies and a majority of others in positions of responsibility are in favor of abolishing the 12-hour day, and for this reason and because of the public sentiment, it is our endeavor and expectation to decrease the working hours—where we hope, in the comparatively near future."

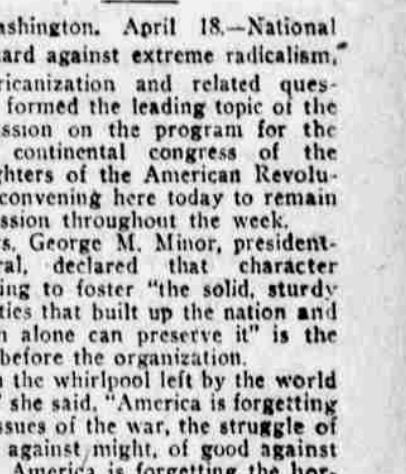
