"At present," he said, "we are

As to independence, the premier said, that at the time of coniederation, McDonald, McNab, Cauchon and Tache had not hesitated to speak of independence and Cauchon had predicted that conclusion when we had a poulation of 6,000,000 and a trade of \$250,000,000. "We have passed that stage and I do not want to be an apostle of independence but evidently we will not always be a colony, and the day will come when we will take our place in the family of nations.

"I may be wrong, but it seems to me that annexation to the United States would be fatal to our race.

"The Americans are the greatest of assimilators. Few races or na-tionalities which get into that big stream maintain their character and their traits."
