## Oil and Electricity THE GUMPS---May Be Substituted For Coal in Britain

Strike of Coal Miners Turns Attention Toward Defendance for Industrial Power -Electricity for Rails.

Should the National City and the Mechanics and Metals banks of New York consummate a merger then there would be for the first time a departure from the fundamental policy which was established by the late James Stillman, after he became president of the National City bank. He was opposed at least so far as the City bank is concerned, to gaining an increase in strength, resources and securing greatly enlarged deposits by absorbing any other bank. He be lieved that the National City bank hould gain strength through its own itiative and by bringing into its support and into association with it some of the more powerful influences of the day. Thus he did bring into association with the bank the socalled Rockefeller and to some extent the Standard Oil and sugar influences.

All who have followed the growth of the National City bank until it has become one of the world's greatest banking institutions will be astonished to learn that the reports, some of them a year or more old, which have told of contemplated absorption by the City bank of the Mechanics and Metals were well founded. Of course here was some fascination in conimplating the result which would ollow absorption. It would make the institution on a par almost with the largest of the joint stock banks of London. 
