

Immigration Bill Draws Warm Fire In House Debate

New York Members Score Proposed Restriction Measure—Siegel Charges Propagandists Busy.

Washington, April 21.—The immigration restriction bill drew fire yesterday in the house, especially from members from New York, and was as vigorously urged by Chairman Johnson of the immigration committee and other representatives who declared legislation to keep out undesirable immigrants necessary.

Leading the fight on the measure were Representatives Crockan, democrat; Siegel, republican; Chandler, republican and London, socialist, all of New York; Sabath, democrat, Illinois; Stevenson, democrat, South Carolina, and Huddleston, democrat, Alabama. Mr. Crockan declared the bill marked the renunciation and abandonment of the policy which had fixed the position of the United States in the civilized world.

Representative Siegel charged that propagandists and skillful agitators had done much to bring about the bill. Mr. London said that the measure would strike at the very people we went to war to emancipate, and charged the bill was an expression of prejudice.

Present Laws Adequate. Representative Chandler declared present laws were adequate to keep out undesirable aliens.

Mr. Stevenson criticized the action of Attorney General Cummings in permitting Eugene J. DeLoach, a member of his prison guard and come here at his will to seek a pardon.

A statement issued by the State department said that "Secretary Hughes did not make, and did not intend to make, any recommendations regarding immigration" in transmitting to congress reports from American consuls abroad dealing with the movement of emigrants to the United States.

It was stated in an Associated Press dispatch last night that Mr. Hughes had made such a recommendation and he also was quoted as saying "restriction on immigration should be so rigid that it would be impossible for most of these people to enter the United States," reference being made "especially to Armenians, Jews, Persians and Russians."

As a matter of fact that quotation appeared in a paraphrase of a report from the American consul at Tiflis, relating to people in that district, which was among a number of similar reports transmitted to the house and senate immigration committees by Mr. Hughes.

Publication of extracts from the government reports was the subject of discussion in the house. Representative Chandler, republican, New York, who formerly was consul of the United States at Letts and Lithuania, took exception to an official government report which said the Letts and Lithuanians seeking to leave for the United States were largely people from the slums, the vast majority of them Jews of the undesirable type.

"I do not believe Mr. Hughes authorized this or any similar report," said Mr. Chandler. "It came from abroad. Mr. Hughes is too big and noble brained to consent to anything of that kind."

Guerrilla War In Erin Continues

Houses in Tralee Bombed—Court House at Oaskey Burned.

Dublin, April 21.—Guerrilla warfare in Ireland continues. Several cars of a train carrying military police were derailed last evening between Gortalea, County Kerry, and Castle Island, County Kerry, and subjected to machine gun fire, but the attacking forces were driven off.

Nine houses in Tralee were bombed last night. These included offices of the newspapers Kerryman and Liberator, the printing machines of which were wrecked.

Several attacks on various police barracks are reported. At Oaskey a light raged two hours, during which the court house was burned. It is reported for the killing of soldiers Sunday, several houses were destroyed at Ennis.

Forbidden to Leave. Dublin, April 21.—The Dal Eireann has decreed "no citizen of the republic shall leave Ireland without permission from the proper authority." Under the decree shipping and emigration agents are forbidden to accept passage money or to issue tickets to intending Irish immigrants, unless they produce a printed permit.

Persons disobeying these regulations will be "deemed guilty of a grave offense against the welfare of the state in time of war and dealt with accordingly."
