Understand Labor View. In this view Mr. Teagle was fully supported a few days later by A. C. Bedford who passed from the presidency of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey to the chairman of the board. President Teagle and Chairman Bedford are now and always have been in full accord so far as the mutual relations between employers and employes are concerned. Both have had experience as actual working men. Both, like Charles M.

pany is held once a year.

Fourth Annual Conference.

A conference of this kind was held a few days ago. Addresses which were made by President Teagle. Chairman Bedford and by representatives of the employes were of far more than exclusive interest to those who took part in the conference. They taught an object lesson which, if it be learned both by employers and employes, will go far towards establishing harmony of relations and a thorough understanding by all who are engaged in production, whether selaried officers or wage earners, of their responsibility and opportunity.

It was evident from some of the thoughts which were volced by President Teagle that he fully understands some of the difficulties and the cause of these difficulties which now embarrass both those who labor as wage earners and those who work as salaried employes. There was clear intimation in President Teagles address of his recognition of the fact that there are radical leaders of labor who take advantage of a scarcity of labor to demand extravagant wages while at the same time giving a decreased output. This siways results, President Teagle intimated, in making the public, as the ultimate consumers, pay the reasonable prices. After a while the public refuses to pay these prices. This amounts to nothing less than a voluntary strike, tacit and unorganized, on the part of the public. It necessarily follows that a demand for products falls off there comes the necessity of laying off wage earners so that in the long run they do not gain any benefit from the extravagant pay and decreased output which their leaders demand.

Other Side of Picture.

extravagant wages demanded by radical labor leaders when there is scarcity of labor.

It was evident from President Teagle's remarks and also from an address which was made by Chairman Bedford that they are of the opinion that gradually but surely labor leaders who are conservative, broadminded and fair as well as employers who are of the same disposition are approaching a true solution of the labor problem, and there must be a solution of this problem if our industrial and commercial life is to be established upon a sound and permanent foundation.

Mr. Bedford long ago looked upon collective bargaining in all matters which were of common interest as sound policy which could be made effective through industrial representation at the table where the collective bargaining is under discussion. That plan has been adopted by this corporation and Mr. Bedford said it is to be continued. Furthermore, no man or woman will be discriminated against on account of religious, social, fraternity or union relations. Mr. Bedford believes that every working man and woman should have one day's rest in the seven and if possible that day should be Sunday. He and Mr. Teagle have worked out a plan whereby employes may be aided by becoming stockholders. There are also general welfare plans now underway.

Already this great corporation has discovered that it has gone far towards solving the problem whose solution involved the discovery of the factors which make possible harmony between all, whether wage earners or wage payers of those whose occupation it is to provide commodities and to offer these commodities to the public.

Differences to Be Threshed Out in Conferences and Employes Will Have Representation. By HOLLAND.

A few days after Walter Clark Teagle came to New York to begin his duties as the newly chosen presi-dent of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, he set forth in some detail in an informal conversation which lasted throughout the entire evening his view respecting the rela-tion of labor to production, to the employers and to the public. In fact, it seemed as though Mr. Teagle's first thought when underaking his new responsibilities referred to the men who work for wages and especially those who are employed by the large corporations. For early in hi conversation he said speaking earnestly that "we ought to remember he common humanity which characterizes every one who is engaged in production, whether a skilled artisan, a manual laborer or the salaried officer of a corporation, as well as the stockholders." He was of the opinion that if this common humanity was more fully recognized it would be all the easier to perfect satisfac-

tory relations which would make possible full harmony between all who are employed by the corporations.. Schwab, have good understanding of the point of view which labor takes, having been themselves real workers

having been themselves real workers.

It was enevitable, therefore, that speedily there should be demonstrated in the
management of the Standard Oil company
of New Jerrey a good understanding of
much that is needed in order to obtain
harmony between the wage payers and the
wage earners.

Among other influences to this end
created by President Teagle and Chairman
Bedford was the establishment of a council board, so to call it, at which conferences between representatives of the company and representatives chosen by the
employes could meet and discuss subjects
of common interest, thrash out if necesmary perplexing situations and at lest
reach a common agreement. These conferences are held at stated times and a
general meeting of the representatives of
12700 employes and officers of the company is held once a year.
