**Handy Helpers**  
Several little hand brushes which cost 8 or 10 cents, will be of great service about the kitchen. Have one for cleaning hands after mixing bread, working in the garden, etc., another to clean vegetables for baking, or to clean potatoes to boil them with their jackets on. Use one for washing a chicken with warm water before putting it on to cook, and one for cleaning cut glass which makes the task easily and quickly done.  
Use a brush when washing overalls, rugs or other coarse, heavy articles that are much soiled. Each time when you are through with the brush rinse it in warm water and put it to dry with bristles downward.  
Woolen blankets should not be used for ironing board covers. They retain the moisture and make it hard to iron clothes dry.
