Convention of Third Club District

Mrs. W. E. Miner of Oakland will call to order the 18th annual convention of the Third district N. F. W. C. on the evening of May 3, at Central City. The theme of the convention program is to be, "Our Own Third District Being a Presentation and Discussion of People, History and Tradition, and Assets Generally of that Part of Nebraska, Together with a Presentation and Discussion of Problems Peculiar to the Third District that Fall under the Heads of the Several Departments of Woman's Club Work."

The principal addresses will be "John Neihardt, Man and Poet," by Dr. House of Wayne Normal; "Indians of Northeast Nebraska," by Mrs. Harry Keefe of Walthill; "Parliamentary Law the Rule of the Road," by Mrs. John Slaker of Hastings, state president; "Interior Decoration," illustrated by Miss Helene Mitchell of Lincoln, and "The Call of the Children," by Mrs. A. E. Sheldon of Lincoln, general federation director from Nebraska.

Three round tables are listed: "Two of My Club's Activities This Year," to be told in two minutes by each of the 53 club presidents in the Third district; "One Point of Interest in My Country Worth Knowing," to be told in one minute by a representative from each of the 18 counties in the Third district; "Our Best Club Program This Year," to be told in 10 words or less by each of the 53 clubs' delegates.

Each of the 12 departments of work, two special interests, and several standing committees will present reports and outlines of work adopted to Third district needs. Spirited assembly singing and choice individual musical selections will intersperse the entire program.

The culmination of the Third district poetry prize contest inaugurated last January will take place the first evening when the winners will be present to read their poems and receive their prize awards made possible by contributions from individual clubs.

The two social features of the convention will be the 6 o'clock dinner on Wednesday evening followed by a program of toasts presided over by Mrs. E. H. Penney of Fullerton, state vice president, and the "swell lunch and auto ride Thursday noon when Central City Woman's Club will act as hostess.

The various teams in the state are sometimes given the affirmative and sometimes the negative side of the question, but that fact has apparently made no difference to the winning Central High school team.
