Secretary of the Navy Edwin Denby went down on board the Sylph and both had interesting parties with them. Mrs. Denby has not yet arrived in Washington. The trips on the Mayflower are bright spots in an otherwise strained existence of a president and in the past several administrations have been worth while features of the spring, summer and autumn. Mrs. Roosevelt rarely went aboard, as she was not a good salior. The second Mrs. Wilson thoroughly enjoyed the cruises with her husband and they rarely took any guests but immediate members of the family, and at that there were never but

one or two of these.




