The Nurses Training school of St. Joseph hospital will celebrate the 101st anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale with a literary and musical program, Thursday, May 12, at St. Joseph hospital. This celebration will be universal in training schools throughout this country and Canada and is the response to the movement inaugurated by the national hospital day committee of Chicago. Florence Nightingale is given credit for having established the first training school for nurses.
