He said he wanted to make sure that all American rights were thoroughly protected in this respect. He also is giving close study to the question of protecting the rights of American shipowners who are fearful of discrimination egainst them abroad unless the privileges they were to receive under the Versailles pact are fully reserved.

Lively and extended discussion of the whole international sitution. with particular reference to President Harding's recent declaration to resume participation in European councils, is expected to break out in the senate tomorrow or the next day in connection with consideration of the naval bill.







Canadian Wheat Being **Rushed to United States**

Duluth, May 12 .- Shipments of Canadian wheat are being rushed into the United States through Duhull free of duty by shippers who anticipate the signing of the emergency tariff measure by President Harding, according to the local customs office. The measure would impose a customs duty of 35 cents a bushel on imported wheat.

Approximately 816.000 bushels of the grain have been shipped through this district during the last month. Ordinary shipments vary from 500,-000 to 3.000.000 hushels a season. Since September 1, 1920, 863,922 bushels have been shipped in.

California Grape Crop

Damaged By Cold Weather Sacramento, May 12 .- The grape crop of California for 1921 was reduced about 30 per cent by frosts and adverse weather conditions during the spring and consequently the yield for the season will be about 70 per cent of that of 1920, according to an estimate made public by R. L. Nougaret, viticultural expert of the State Department of Agriculture.




