Considering railroad claims conflicting with the government, the chairman said, the total amount rose to \$2,500,000,000, and he gave as his own estimate \$1,800,000,000 as the inal loss which the government was likely to sustain.

Private Control at Stake.

"That situation challenges the permanency of private owenrship," he declared.

A table showing what sums had been expended for railway operating expenses and taxes from 1917 to 1920, inclusive, was submitted by ulius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the oard of the Southern Pacific, who appeared for conclusion of his crossexamination in connection with the committee's inquiry into the railroad situation.

The total of operating expenses and taxes for the railroads, according to the table, rose from \$3,043, 000,000 in 1917 to \$6,047,000,000 in 1920. Salaries of general officers of the railroads in 1920 totalled \$47,-119,465, as against \$3,605,755,516 for


