

Summer Schedule On U. P. Will Go Into Effect May 29

Denver Special to Be Restored—Will Leave Omaha, Westbound, at 8:10 A. M. and Reach Denver 8:59 P. M.

Summer schedules for Union Pacific trains will go into effect Sunday, May 29.

The Los Angeles limited, train No. 7, and the Overland Limited, train No. 1, will leave Chicago one hour later or at 8 and 8:10 p. m., respectively.

The Los Angeles limited will leave Omaha at 9:40 a. m. and arrive in Los Angeles at 2:40 p. m. The Overland Limited will leave Omaha at 9:45 a. m. and reach San Francisco at 2:30 p. m.

These changes are made to effect more connections in Chicago and Omaha and to avoid interrupting the breakfast hour at Omaha.

Denver Special Restored.

The Denver Special will be restored out of Chicago May 29 and out of Omaha May 30. The first eastbound trip will be May 31 and the train will pass through Omaha at 2 a. m., June 1. The Denver Special will stop in Nebraska at Fremont, Columbus and North Platte, and in Colorado at Julesburg.

The westbound Denver Special, train No. 11, will leave Chicago over the Northwestern at 6:05 p. m., leave Omaha at 8:10 a. m., and reach Denver at 8:59 p. m. The eastbound, train No. 14, will leave Denver at 10:30 p. m., reach Omaha at 2 a. m. and Chicago at 4 p. m.

Changes Slight
The new train will carry through coach and sleeping cars and will have observation-buffet car service west of Omaha and lounge car service east of Omaha. This train is put on to care for summer tourist business which starts June 1.
Changes of Nebraska trains are slight, except that the morning train from Norfolk will leave at 9:25 and reach Columbus at 11:30 a. m., making close connections with the morning transcontinental trains at Columbus and shortening the time of the Norfolk branch points to Omaha by about an hour.

Designer From East Studies Omaha Styles

Jacob Marks, prominent American designer of men's clothes, is in Omaha for a short visit, to make a study of the young men here on the way they want to wear clothes. He comes as the guest of A. E. Barker, of the Barker Clothes shop.

Just what a middle west man wants in a suit of clothes is one of the problems which confronts Mr. Barker.
"Are the ideas of the man of the middle west well regarded to styles different from the man of the east?" asks Mr. Barker.
"It is true," he continues, "that I, myself, could really see the styles so designed for local conditions, but I translate the idea to designers themselves is a task almost impossible. This is why Mr. Marks, one of America's foremost designers, is in Omaha."
This is the first time an eastern designer has attempted to study style conditions in Omaha, and if successful, the plan will be repeated each year, according to Mr. Barker.
Mr. Marks goes from here to Chicago.
