#### **Funeral of Late** Chief Justice Is **Held at Capital**

Final Honors Paid by Nation to Presiding Officer of High Tribunal-All Government Offices Closed.

Washington, May 21.-With honors rendered doubly impressive by the simplicity of the ceremony, the body of Edward Douglass White, thief justice of the United States, was buried today in Oak Hill cemetery, to sleep forever within sound of the city where his great service to the nation was rendered.

Simultaneous with the hour of the funeral, President Harding had ordered that the American flag wherever flown be half-masted and that a funeral salute of 17 guns be fired at American military and naval stations throughout the world. A small company had gathered at


