

# Buffaloes Lose Fourteen Inning Game to Jack Coffey's Boosters, 4 to 3

## Second Contest Called at End Of Second Frame

### Daniels Relieves Glasier in Fifth—Moeller's Double in 14th Spoils Omaha's Winning Streak.

Jack Coffey and his Des Moines Boosters have discovered that by sticking around in one place long enough they can win a ball game.

In the 14th inning of their third game of the series with the Omaha Buffaloes here yesterday afternoon, Danny Moeller spanked the ball into center field for a double, scoring Kennedy with the run that gave the Boosters a 4 to 3 victory over the locals and at the same time spoiling the winning streak of the home club. Kennedy had started the fuss when he reached first on a fielder's choice, and was camping on the initial bag when Moeller leaped on the ball for his two-base wallop that spelled curtains for the local herd.

Thus, after hurling 14 innings Pitcher Black stepped into a victory, which required of him the twirling of good ball from start to finish. He received good support. In fact the Boosters played much better ball yesterday than they did in the first two games of the series.

### Very Large Crowd.

The pastime was quaint at times, and in other spots exciting enough to put plenty of "pep" into one of the largest crowds of fans that has ever attended a Sunday game in Omaha. After Des Moines scored one in the fourth and two in the sixth, the Buffaloes came back in the eighth and ended up matters and then both clubs drifted through six innings before a runner crossed the rubber.

Here Glasier started twisting 'em over for Manager Burch but, after hurling five and one-third innings and allowing nine hits, of which one was a triple and another a double, the Buffaloes' boss derided him in favor of Daniels.

Letty was nicked for five hits, including Moeller's fatal double in the fourth.

The Boosters registered their first tally in the fourth stanza, when Milan singled to center and took third on Coffey's blow over second, scoring when Anderson planted the ball in center field for a single. Two more Des Moines' men were chalked up in the sixth, when O'Connor singled to right and scampered to second when Milan played the big brother act. Coffey got his second hit of the game, a double, scoring O'Connor. Brown singled and Coffey galloped home with the third Des Moines tally.

Two Doubles in Seventh.

In the seventh inning for Omaha Lingle doubled and Haney followed with a two-base blow after two Buffaloes had popped out. Lingle scored on Haney's wallop and the latter crossed the pan on Lee's single. The final Omaha score came in the eighth, when Lelivelt clouted the horseshoe to right field for a double, taking third on Griffin's sacrifice and scoring when O'Brien sacrificed.

Omaha had a chance to win in the fourth when Gilason started the round with a single, taking second on Haney's sacrifice. Lee reached first on a Booster bobble and Gilason trotted to third. The speedy little Omaha fielder then scored second and third on Griffin's stroll to the plate. Hurler Black decided the best thing to do with Griffin would be to issue the Buffalo a free cutout to first, all of which he did. With two down and the bags loaded the prospects of the locals emerging out of a long game on the big end of the score took a big jump when O'Brien came to bat. He cracked the ball against the right field fence, but the hit amounted to nothing as the runner traveled outside the chalk line. O'Brien took another cut at Black's delivery and instead of hitting the ball hit the wind and the game ended.

A doubleheader was on the card, but due to the length of the first contest and the fact that the visitors had to make train connections early in the evening, the second clash lasted but two innings. Des Moines was ahead at the end of the second, 1 to 0.

Frank, my oldest brother, Bernard, took the long route trial away from the shore.

### Strolling back, we got to talking over my early fights around Colorado and Ben recalled one fellow who could take more punishment than anybody I ever saw.

This was a big husky bird named George Copeland who had been treating a lot of battlers around Denver and Cheyenne pretty rough.

### Ben and I were in Cripple Creek in 1915 when he got a fight arranged with Copeland and Ben went and dug up all the spare change he could to bet on me.

The miners around Cripple Creek thought pretty well of Copeland and Ben found no trouble in getting his money up at odds of 3 to 1 against me. Why, even after the first round in which I had knocked all Copeland's front teeth out and had flogged him a few times, Ben found miners willing to bet on Copeland.

### They thought he was stalling and would finish a youngster like me in a couple of rounds.

Well, for the next two or three rounds I hit that fellow Copeland with everything I had. I closed his eyes and had him badly beaten up and I forgot how often I knocked him down, but I couldn't put him out and the referee finally stopped the battle.

### Copeland was certainly the greatest punch absorber I ever met.

All the scrubs were stiff and sore from the base ball and soccer games yesterday, so we postponed our daily struggle.

### I contented myself with a little bag-punching and put in about half an hour kicking the foot ball around.

Another warm sun brought out a crowd that packed the arena, and I started out with the usual 10 minutes of shadow boxing to warm me up. This was the first day that I worked without my jersey and long trunks. My little sparring partners Alex, Trambitas, Joe Benjamin and
