

Insurance Epert Favors Review of Rates by States

Formation of Local Companies To Compete With Eastern Concerns Advocated by Alfred M. Best.

That states ought to review insurance rates as to reasonableness and adequacy toward licensing insurance companies, in place of a private exchange holding control over the various companies, is the belief of Alfred M. Best, expert insurance critic and editor of numerous insurance pamphlets in New York City.

Mr. Best was in Omaha Sunday and Monday in consultation with insurance men on private matters. The middle west is not backward in the insurance business, Mr. Best declared.

Believes in Local. In the last five years numerous local companies have been established, and with success, he said. "I believe in the formation of local companies if they are big enough to compete with eastern insurance firms it encourages competition. The present money stringency has not affected the insurance business materially," Mr. Best continued.

Polices for \$1,000,000,000 Insured. Nearly \$1,000,000,000 in fire and marine insurance was written in this country in the past year, nearly 100 per cent increase over the previous record, Mr. Best said.

Telephone Company Discontinues Giving Location of Fires

No doubt you have had the experience of trying to make an important telephone call at the time of a fire and have not been able to get a prompt response from an operator.

This probably happened for the reason that the operators were busily engaged in answering inquiries as to the location of the fire.

It is the habit of many people to lift their receivers and ask the location of the fire every time that the fire department dashes along the street. This condition paralyzes the telephone service for several minutes.

Giving out information as to the location of fires necessarily results in the delay of telephone calls for doctors, the police, reports of other fires and important business and social messages.

For this reason, it has been decided to discontinue, as of June 1, the practice of giving out information as to the location of fires.

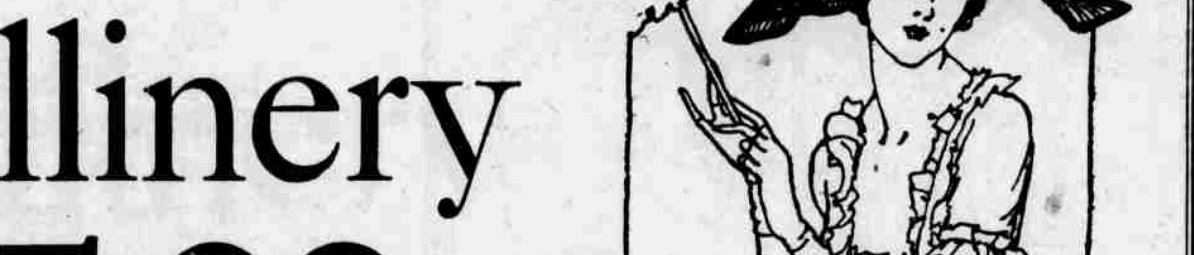
