Samuel Vauclaim, president of the Baldwin Locomotive company, is quoted as having said that he looks for prosperity unexampled in our history not later than December of this year and possibly as early as No-vember. Mr. Vauclaim differs from other directors of great industries in other directors of great industries in setting the time so late in the year.

He has also sold another of the central European nations many locomotives and the contract calls for a payment in barter. That nation possesses large resources in oil and Mr. Vauclaim has agreed to accept oil in exchange for the

sometimes the traffic through the Soo canal furnishes an excellent evidence of industrial conditions. We may not have exported as many of our commodities to foreign countries in April of this year as we did in April a year ago, and yet the freight which passed through the Soo canal in April was nearly 80 per cent greater than the amount transported through that canal in April a year ago. The westbound traffic consisted chiefly of cargo coal of which there is great need in some parts of the northwest. The eastbound cargoes were for the most part wheat and other grains. From the day when the canal was free from fee until May 1, 16,000,000 bushels of wheat and other srains were taken on their way eastward through this canal. While Europe is not buying probably because it had not the means to buy as large an amount of American raw material as it did last year, it certainly is buying heavily cour food products and these heavy shipments of grain through the Soo canal to the ocean ports of themselves tell the story of Europe's demand for food.
