The corpotion will finance the United States Grain Growers and finance the stor-ing of grain and supply funds when banks are unable to do so, accord-ing to Mr. Gustafson. To Solicit Members.

In the next few months trained solicitors, all farmers, will go through Nebraska soliciting members for the Grain Growers, and selling finance corporation Membership in the Grain Growers for life is \$10, while stock in the cor-poration is \$100 a share. Buying shares in the corporation, however,

s not compulsory. "The finance corporation is planned, owned and controlled solely by the farmers and asks no favors of anybody," President Gustafson said. An Honest Effort.

'It is an honest effort to establish an honest competitive grain marketing system and will not interfer with any other farm organization in existence. We hope to prove to non-member farmers the soundness of our organization so that all farmers will want to join without urging: "The new corporation is incorpated in Delaware and the stock is assured," the president said.


