At the head of the great stairway which leads from the main floor of the Union League club to the library, a portrait of Gen. Horace Porter was hung a few days before his death. The painter had caught and placed upon the canvas the familiar and characteristic expression which even in moments of excitement dominated General Porter's features. It seemed almost as though the pictured lips would part

to speak. Chauncey M. Depew stood for many minutes on the day of General Porter's death before this portrait. He was much affected by it. He said that it was a true likeness of a great American and one with whom he had been in intimate friendship for many years. He turned his face for a moment to conceal his emotion and then, mastering himself, said sadly, friend has gone and I, three years

his elder, have been left." Depew, Joseph H. Choate and General Porter were a distinguished group of three of the generation that has passed who had gained national reputation and who represented not only much that was best in New York City but also in the United States. Of these three, Depew alone remains and there is no promise of a succession to these three in the generation which is now taking the place of the older generation, of which a few venerable men

remain. Acute Intellect.

General Porter possessed perhaps the most acute intellect of any of the three. He differed greatly in many respects from the other two with whom his name had been so frequently associated. All were masters of one form or another of public speech. Each reached his highest power as an orator by methods which distinguished each from the others.

No man labored with more intense concentration of mind while preparing the sentences which he was to deliver in public than General Porter. He carved each sentence as the sculptor carves the marble. He simed at perfect concentration into the simplest form of a thought which he believed to be worthy of utterance and as he always thought concisely so his sentences were many times of epigrammatic form. He adopted the long sentence and he was almost needlessly critical in his choice of words.
