"There is no question but the Oriental question will occupy the center of the spotlight, whether we want it to or not. We must learn to be world citizens.

Miss Paxson, who is an Omaha girl, the sister of Miss Susan Pax-ton and Mrs. C. W. Hayes, spent 10 years in China. She is most optimistic about the

future of the country, despite its present dark outlook. "God must have some work for he Chinese to do in this world, He made so many of them," she said The total population is 400,000,000. or one-fourth of the world popula-

Graft in the government is responsible for China's present plight, she stated.
