Uncle Sam to Get Half Million Bucks From Dempsey Bout

New York, June 9 .- Uncle Sam never drew on a boxing glove in his life, but he'll make more money than Jack Dempsey, Georges Carpentier or Tex Rickard on July 2.

Figures were quoted today by internal revenue officials. Dempsey's income tax for \$300,000 approximately what he will receive for the battle, will amount to \$161,-Carpentier's toll, when exemptions for his wife and child are subtracted will total \$93,334. That makes the score on the division of the purse read:

United States government, \$254,-604: boxers, \$245,396. The marked difference between the
