New York, June 10.-Bradstreets tomor-row will say: "Trade and industry are irregular and cross currents are numerous with ng two adjacent markets returning exactly the same reports. Wholesale and jobbing business shows an increase of midseason quiet and industry has rather slackened, with collections about as slow as at any time since mid-winter. Retail trade is about as goed as at any time this year and crop reports are quite uniformly favorable. The biggest winter wheat growing areas report better conditions than at the date the latest government report.
