

Over Half Space For Building Show Now Taken

Success of Past Exhibit Proven
By Activity in Erection of
Small Homes in
Vicinity.

Forty-four of the 75 spaces for the second annual complete building show to be held at the Auditorium in January of next year, under the direction of Robert C. Mitchell and Charles A. Frank, have been purchased and contracts signed. Other spaces will be sold in the near future while a few will be left open indefinitely.

Practically every local exhibitor who participated in the April building show has secured space, and in many instances additional room for the coming show. The activity in the building of small homes throughout the city and surrounding towns is evidence that the show did accomplish its purpose in the way of stimulating the building industry.

Architects aver the city report increasing demands for small home plans. "Last week persons contracted with me for 12 plans," Everett S. Dodds, local architect, said yesterday. "Building of small homes is increasing daily."

Mr. Mitchell will leave Omaha today for Chicago where he will make the coming building show and will return to Omaha during the winter with many new plans.

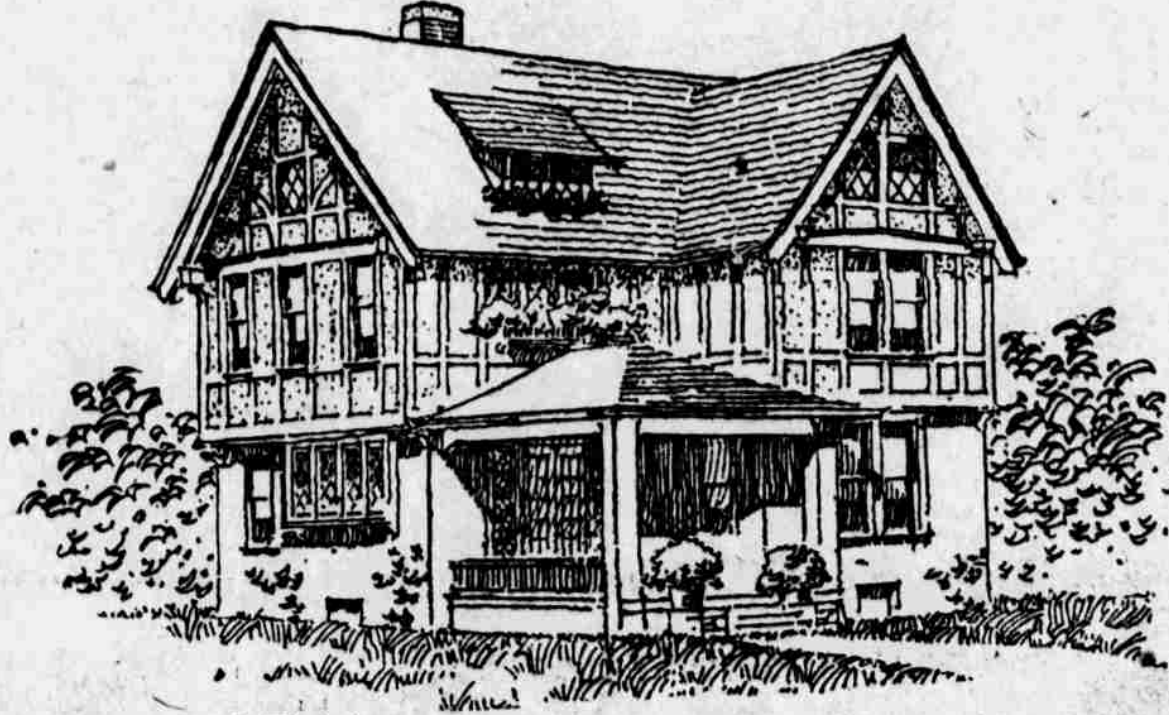

Real Estate Board to Hold Summer Outing Thursday

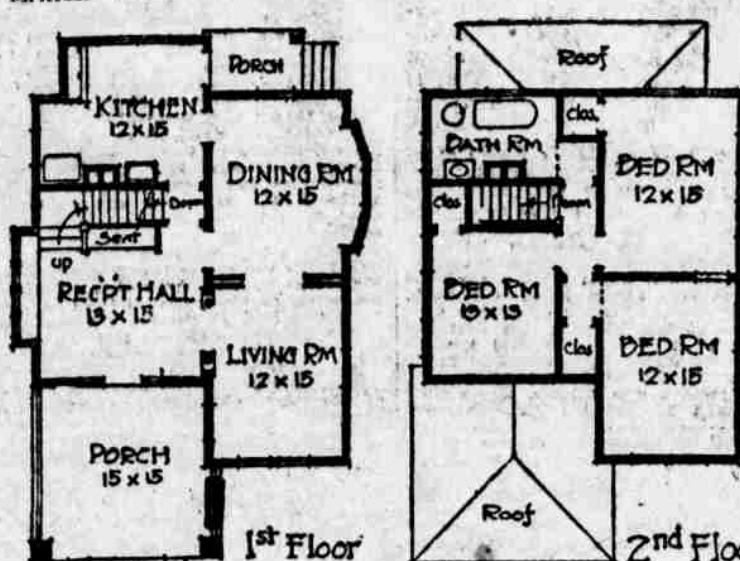
The Omaha Real Estate board's annual summer outing will be held Thursday afternoon and evening, next, at the Field club.

Veteran Realtor Tells of Early Days in Omaha

Fiftieth Anniversary of Bee
Causes John L. McCague
To Ponder on City's
Progress.

Although The Bee's 50th anniversary edition has a tendency to cause those who have been in business here for several years to look backward, according to John L. McCague, veteran realtor and former president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. McCague maintains that the business outlook should always be forward, "to the rising sun."

"Neither the city nor any of its citizens should ever look toward the setting sun," Mr. McCague said. "It is to the rising sun that I always look, and that all of us must look to keep Omaha growing in the future as she has grown in the past."

"The last 50 years has been one of marvelous growth for this city. There is no reason to believe this growth is going to stop. We will continue ahead."

Two Big Projects

"There are now underway in Omaha two big developments, the Dodge street grading job, about to be finished, and the St. Marys avenue project, well underway. Five years ago there were few people in Omaha who believed these things would ever be done."

"Almost every year the city will grow in ways that will surprise most of her citizens."

Mr. McCague last week went through some of his old files and found some pamphlet advertisements of real estate that he issued in 1883. They were little four-page folders, the first page being given over to a discussion of the general business and money situation. At that time he advised that there would be no "boom," but a steady conservative growth, with opportunities for safe investments in real estate. "That same advice applies now," he said.

Mrs. McCague's advertisement included the Fry street store, corner Sixteenth and Douglas streets, for \$7,500; a three-story brick building, 45 feet wide, on Farnam street between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, for \$20,000; a big Dodge street property between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets for \$10,000; houses in the Twenty-fourth street neighborhood between Capitol avenue and Leavenworth street for from \$3,000 to \$4,500; a 320-acre farm (now Keystone Park addition) for \$4,200 (sold for \$3,000).

"In those days," Mr. McCague said, "I rarely put up a sign west of Twenty-fourth street, because that was too far out in the country. Look at it now."

Plan to Build 15 to 20 Houses in Benson This Year

Benson & Carmichael are planning the erection of several houses in Benson this year, probably 15 or 20. The firm started one house and sold it before the foundation was completed and will begin another house this week.

"The amount of building we will do," E. A. Benson said, "will depend upon the apparent demand. Indications are that this demand will be strong, because the houses are small and moderately priced."
