London spot onts held unchanged, while Antwerp ruled ½ franc lower.

"High temperatures and the advance of the season have made for some increase in distribution of light sensonal goods at retail and favored a fairly active reorder business from jobbers.—Collections are slightly slower, and weather irregularities, much needed rains in some sections, particularly the south, continued drouth and heat in others, notably the Atlantic coast states, impart irregularity to crop reports, though not materially changing the sood outlook previously noted in the most impertant surplus grain producing areas. Reflection of this latter is had in the not vitally important declines shown in wheat prices, despite rust reports from the northwest and advices of premature ripening of winter wheat. Reports from different sections still lack uniformity, although the general statement may be made that things commercial are on the quiet side.
