 Detroit, June 28.—Sixty years ago it is claimed, Peter Girard, scion of one of Detroit's most prominent families of the day, married a half-breed girl in the Michigan wilderness. A daughter was born to the couple.
 The daughter, now the mother of three married daughters, has brought suit in circuit court here to obtain a share of the Girard estate, valued at \$50,000.
 She is Mrs. Agnes Celia Poole and is opposed in her suit by Mrs. Caroline Ackerman Girard, Peter's widow, and Miss Mary E. Pierce, an adopted daughter. Peter married Caroline Ackerman, Mrs. Poole alleges, after deserting his half-Indian, half-French woodlands bride.
