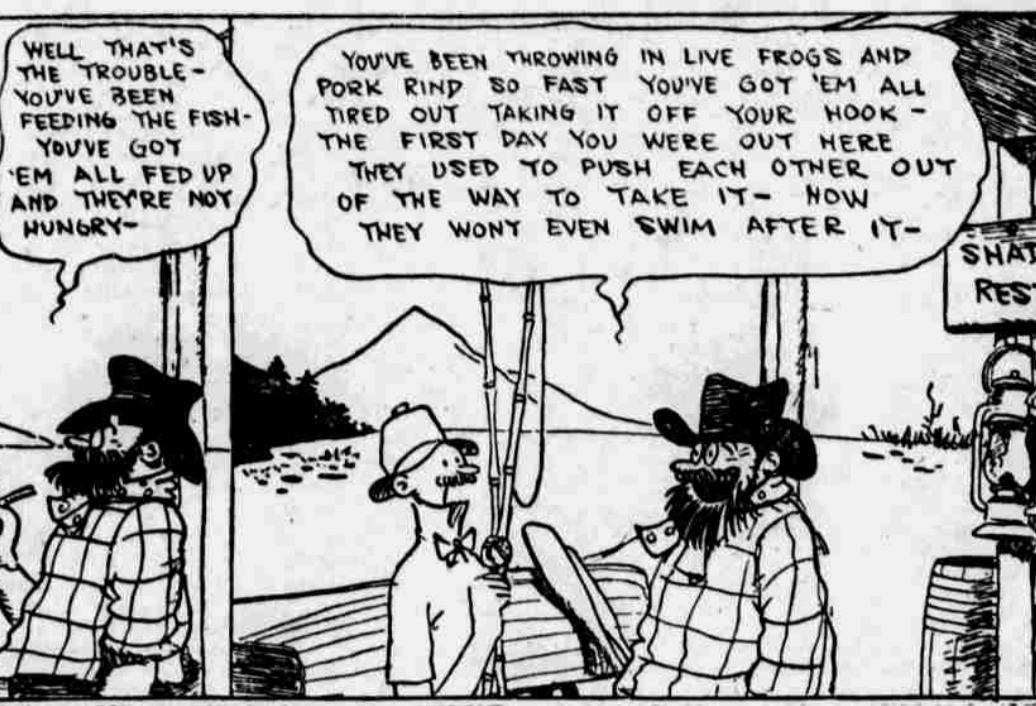

Friends Say Taft Is Well Qualified For Chief Justice

Successful Experience as Philippine Governor and as Judge in Ohio Cited by Acquaintances.

By HOLLAND. Mr. Taft will not be embarrassed by many difficulties as was one of his predecessors who served as chief justice of the supreme court. The estate left by that chief justice was reported to be insolvent. It was also the understanding that he had expended all of the fortune he had accumulated by the practice of law, about \$100,000, in order to meet his expenses while serving as chief justice. His salary was only \$10,500. Mr. Taft as chief justice will receive \$2,000 more, for congress increased the salary of the justice of the supreme court.

New York, July 7.—The enthusiasm derived from the spirited upturn in stock market prices on Wednesday played an important role in today's transactions. During most of the trading period substantially higher prices were recorded, but ultimately the market encountered the profit taking that was to be expected following such a rapid advance and quotations eased off until some of the more active issues showed losses for the day. This, however, was essentially true of the industrials. The rails, for the most part, not only held their gains of the day before, but added to them.
