Washington, July 13 .- After voting to make the proposed veterans bureau an independent organization responsible directly to the president, the senate finance subcommittee today finally completed the redrafting of the Sweet bill consolidating the various government agencies dealing with soldiers' relief.

The subcommittee will make its report to the whole committee tomorrow. It is doubtful whether the whole committee will ratify the report without considerable discussion of the amendment making the bureau a separate institution, although the president's message today may hasten action.
