The Browns threatened in the seventh, when Shelton's double and Kelly's safe slam to left, coupled with a pair of Murphy errors, made the count 4 to 5.

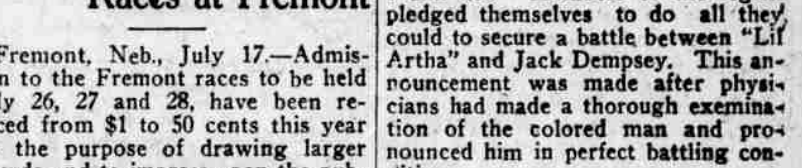
Legion Post Honors Johnson at Banquet
