

Improvement in progress of the crops is not to be called general during the past week. Important districts show improvement, but in the main crops have not had a fair chance. In the spring wheat belt, which occupies the center of the stage at this time, improved temperature conditions have not been accompanied by the desired rainfall in a very large portion of the district, and it is useless to cloak the fact that large areas of small grain in the western part of the spring wheat belt are damaged beyond recovery. The Red and Jim river valleys got good rains during the week, which will prove of great value for most of their crops. But the Jim valley is already harvesting barley and wheat so that those crops are generally too far along to be affected favorably. It is generally conceded that the yield of spring wheat along the southern border of the belt will be a very moderate crop. Add to this the certainty that two thirds of North Dakota, the Black Hills country, and Montana, outside the Milk river valley and perhaps the Miles City district, will have a partial crop failure and the outlook is anything but up to early season promise.
