Chicago, Ill., July 29.-Preferring death by starvation to facing trial on a charge of having slain his wife, Andrew Brykajlo died in the county hospital today as the result of a long hunger strike.

He was taken to the hospital July 14 from the jail where he was awaiting trial when his condition became serious, following his refusal to eat. 'I'll fool the hangman yet." he said. "The man unquestionably starved himself to death," Warden Michael Zinner of the hospital said, "I know that he used to eat a little every day. probably because of acute pains that accompanied the self-starvation, but



Bank Bandits Secure \$9,000

In Robbery at Little Rock Little Rock, Ark., July 29-Two masked men held up the Citizens bank at Bauxite, 15 miles from here, late Thursday, and escaped with approximately \$9,000 in currency and gold which they took from a vault. Mrs. J. S. Ricker, assistant cash-ier, and J. A. Parson, a stockholder, the only persons in the bank, were covered with a revolver by one of the men while the other rifled the open vault. They then compelled Mrs. Ricker and Parson to accompany them a short distance from town in a taxicab, there paying the
