Nebraska Wheat Crop Will Sell For \$25,000,000

Total U. S. Yield Set at 800,000,000 Bushels; Corn-husker State Corn Crop To Break Record. By HOLLAND. Within the next six weeks the farmers of Nebraska who have been cultivating wheat will have in hand about \$25,000,000, it reports which reach New York are destined. Nebraska is expected to harvest a little over 25,000,000 bushels of wheat which will be marketed probably at \$1.12 a bushel. If this be true of Nebraska, other great wheat-growing states are likely to receive proportionately an even greater amount than the Nebraska farmer. Oklahoma shows considerably more than \$25,000,000. The wheat growing states of the northwest will in the aggregate receive, according to the best estimate, not far from \$100,000,000.

Washington authorities estimate a production of a little over 800,000,000 bushels of wheat. Some of the private estimates of the total yield of bushels as high as 840,000,000. It will be, in any event, in excess of 800,000,000 grown upon nearly 57,000,000 acres.

With the falling off in the production of cotton, which was the result of a smaller amount than usual has been cultivated, the wheat crop attains its prestige as the most valuable of American agricultural products. Unless unfavorable weather conditions prevail, wheat will harvest a corn crop which will yield a record hereof made by that state. The weather thus far has been favorable in Nebraska. Abundant rains have fallen there and throughout the crop from the effects of excessive heat.

Record Crop In 1920. It may be that not so many bushels of wheat will be harvested this year as were harvested in 1920. In 1920, 2,500,000,000 bushels were harvested and that was a record crop. Washington reports that the crop of the year harvest this year will fall short of the record. This estimate should prove to be accurate, yet 100,000,000 bushels in excess of the 1920 record would yield about \$110,000,000.

What the market price will be for each of these many products is now so hard to say. But it is certain that the total receipts of the year will be in excess of \$250,000,000, notwithstanding the heavy decrease in the market price for agricultural products as compared with 1920. These were in 1920 and for several years earlier.

It is noted that throughout the south, notwithstanding the unfavorable cotton situation, farmers are growing more corn. They have so cultivated their fields to corn that the harvest of corn in the south will be in excess of 1920. In the north, the cultivated more corn this year than ever before, and in addition, with the exception of a few states, the yield of corn has been increased more acres to that than had ever been done.

These reports from the south suggest that diversification of crops has been established throughout the entire country. Hereafter they have been principally occupied in the cultivation of cotton and tobacco. Until within a few years Louisiana did not realize that it possessed a soil so well adapted to sugar cane and cotton. Now Louisiana ranks among the great cotton-producing states and the harvest of corn this year will bring millions of dollars to the farmer.

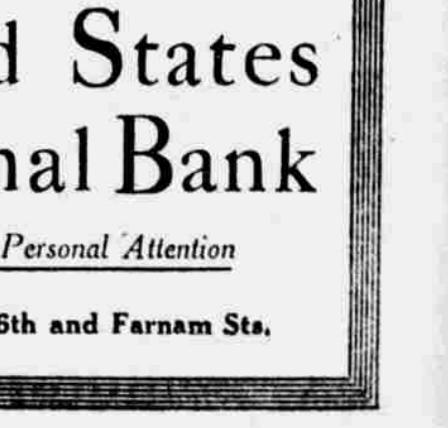
