Borah Believes Germany May Win Trade Supremacy

Says Nation, Despite Debt, May Forge Ahead Unless Allies Curb Expenditures For Armaments.

By GRAFTON S. WILCOX. Chicago Tribune-Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Washington, Aug. 15.—United States Senator William E. Borah believes that Germany, despipte her crushing defeat in the world war, may win the economic supremacy of the world unless the other big na-

tions curb their enormous expenditures for armaments. In a statement prepared for "The Nation's Business," published by United States Chamber of Com-merce, the Idaho senator declares the threat of Germany's economic domination is based on the fact that the burden of armament has been lifted from the backs of the

German people. Germany defeated and disarmed, s paying \$33,000,000,000 in reparations for the world war, but the United States, Senator Borah declares, will pay a greater sum for armament at her present rate of expenditures for national defense.

May Secure Dominance. "Despite her military defeat," says Senator Borah, "Germany, by rea-son of the short-sighted and blundering policies of the allied and associated powers, may yet secure economic dominance of Europe. "Defeat has resulted in Germany's being deprived of her army and her navy. The burden of armament has been forced from the backs of the German people. They may now devote their energies and their talents to agriculture, to industry, to the arts, to the things which constitute the real wealth and strength of a
