## 'Big Ben' Smith Hurls Locals to Two Victories

### Omaha Cops First Affair, 8 To 2, and Second, 8 to 5—Two Contests on Card Today.

The Omaha Buffaloes practically jumped into a tie with the Oklahoma City Indians for second place in the league standings yesterday when they trounced the Des Moines Boosters in a double-header at league park before a small crowd of shivering fans. The scores were 8 to 6 and 8 to 5.

Ray O'Brien's home run over the right field fence in the last of the 10th won the second contest for the Buffaloes. With the score knotted, five all, Mike Massey forced the former to second as then advanced to center. O'Brien stepped up to the plate and parked the horsehide over the timber for a homer, thereby winning the game for the locals.

"Big Ben" Smith was Burch's star moundsman against the Boosters. This former Des Moines player hurled his teammates to a victory in the first contest, allowing the visitors 10 hits, while the rest of the Buffaloes collected eight off the delivery of Black and one of Mr. Schuman.

In the second affair, O'Brien inserted in the seventh, and after allowing the Iowans to tie the score, succeeded in holding his opponents in check after the seventh, winning when O'Brien smacked out his homer.

## Northwestern U. Grid Team to Be Made Up of Vets

Chicago, Sept. 10.—All members of last year's foot ball team at Northwestern university will appear at Evanston for the initial practice with the exception of Buddy Lane and Lassiter.

Elmer McDevitt will leave his law practice in St. Paul to come to Northwestern to coach again. He will be assisted by Jack Sawtelle.

Buddy Lane, graduated last June, will be missed as he was one of the best punters ever developed at Northwestern. But when the first practice is called Coach McDevitt will have at least 15 men who have had experience in conference games.

He is now coaching at least 20 players who know his style of coaching and will be ready to step right in where they left off last year. Last year McDevitt met an almost new squad. This year he will greet veterans.

Jack Hathaway, captain-elect, will serve his third year on the team, Graham Penfield, last year's captain, will be back at one of the guard positions. His heavyweight brother, Henry, will again play tackle. Ole Dahl and Ole Magnuson, guards, Blackwood, Wright, and Conner, halfbacks, will return, and on the wings are other Northwestern men who will return.

Bensinger, star of last year's freshman squad, is expected to replace Lane as the punting expert. He plays halfback. Chuck Palmer, a star in center, Zimmerman and Peterson, Srold and Harry Grausneck are other good backfield men who will answer the call.
