Practically every stall at the barns is occupied and the fields will, without a doubt, be large and, with favorable weather conditions, close finishes and fast time may be expected:

There are three harness races on the program for today, consisting of the 2:20 trot, purse \$800; the 2:03 pace, purse \$1,500, and the 2:09 trot, purse \$1,000.






