After Midget Smith's bout with Pal Moore at Arena week end, Midget will leave for Boston where he and Abe Friedman are matched for a round in October 4.

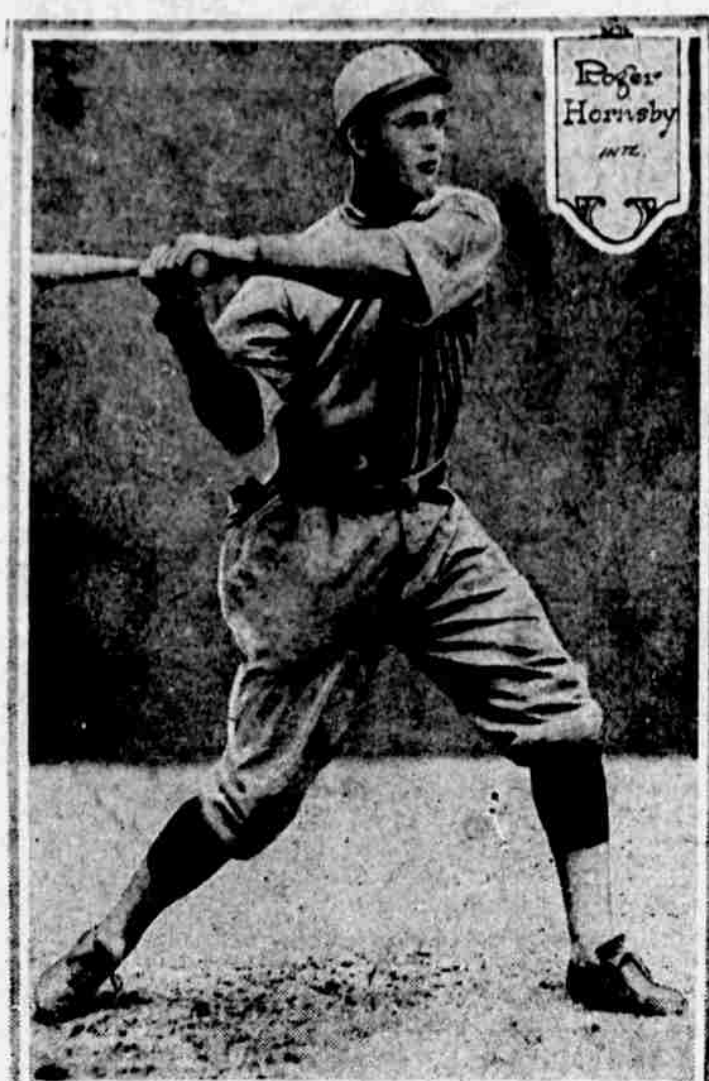
Three Leading Fence Busters in Major League Base Ball
