

"Babe" Ruth Hero of Yanks. 8 to 7 Victory

New York Grabs Firm Hold On First Place by Nosing Cleveland Out of Close Game.

New York, Sept. 26.—New York took a firm grip on first place in the American league and went a long way toward clinching their first championship by defeating Cleveland, 8 to 7, in a thrilling struggle today. The win gave New York three out of four victories from the present world's cham-pions and gave New York a lead of two full games with Cleveland having only four more to play and

"Babe" Ruth was the hero of the New York victory, for he hit two home runs, a two-bagger and walked in four times up. He either scored or drove in five of the eight New York runs. 
