

Packer Men Will Vote On Strike

Election to Decide Whether Employees Are Willing to Leave Jobs to Prevent Cut in Wages.

Ballot Set for Saturday

Packing plant employees throughout the country are to vote on the question of striking to prevent reduction in wages, according to J. W. Burns of Omaha, secretary of district council No. 5 of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America.

The vote is going to be taken next Saturday, Mr. Burns said, "to find out if the men are willing to leave their jobs to protect their interests against lowered wages started by Morris & Company and which will be followed by the other big packers."

Minnesota Republican Launches Bitter Attack on Trade Unions—Shouts defiance to Rail Brotherhood

He shouted defiance at the railroad brotherhoods and expressed the opinion that it might be well for them to carry out their strike threats in order that the railroad controversy might be brought to a showdown and definitely settled.
