Mrs. Mary Newell was sentenced to the penitentiary for 18 months yesterday by District Judge Troup for the slaying of Jess Sillik during a drunken party at the home of Elmer Lathrop, 2620 North Thirteeath street, December 6, 1920. She is the first woman ever con-

trial last February that she saw Mrs. Newell strike the fatal blow with a knife. The defense presented a "conhad killed Sillik.


