Easier Money Conditions

Reported by Reserve Board Washington, Oct. 3.-Increased demand for commercial paper, and generally, a slight reduuction in rates were noted in the review of the acceptance market published today by the federal reserve board. Lower bill rates were ascribed in most districts to easier money con-ditions rather than to the demand for bills. Increased foreign trade during August was cited in one instance as bearing directly on the augmented demand for acceptances.
