

### South Side High School Teacher Has Disappeared

Police Attempting to Connect Mystery With Missing Auto Salesman Claiming Woman as Sister.

A mystery involving a teacher in South Side High school and a salesman for the Jones-Opper company is being investigated by police, who are trying to piece together several mysteries which seem to have a connection.

LaMaude Yule, 43, teacher in South Side High school, disappeared from there Friday and left this note addressed to Principal Ralph Marrs:

"Dear Mr. Marrs: I'm leaving because I can't stand it any longer. I'm going to take a long, long rest. Thank you for your many kindnesses. I am sorry I must leave like this. Think of me as kindly as you can."

**Woman Weeps at Station.**

Friday afternoon at 2 a woman answering the description of Miss Yule was found weeping in the waiting room of the Union station. Mrs. Selan Sherman, the matron, asked her what was the trouble. She

showed the matron bruises on her body and said:

"I have been beaten and robbed of \$500 by a man. I am going to Denver."

The woman later boarded a west-bound Rock Island train.

Friday night a man giving the name of Buckley Conniston called police and stated that his sister, LaMaude Yule, had disappeared after she left school. Yesterday morning the man again called up and asked for his "sister." He gave his address as the Morris hotel. He was advised to come to the police station.

**Truck Found at Depot.**

He then called up the Jones Opper company and asked for a truck in which to search for his sister. The truck was given him. He called at the police station. Later the truck was found at Union station and police were informed that the man had taken a train for Denver.

Miss Yule gave her address to school authorities as 4219 Burdette street, saying she lived there with her aunt, Mrs. Anna Yule.

Mrs. Yule stated yesterday that Miss Yule never lived there. She said also that Miss Yule has no brother named Conniston.

Miss Yule is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and had taught in high schools in Cashton, Wis., Kenosha, Wis., and Milwaukee before coming to the South Side High school in September, 1920.

**Auto Salesman.**

"Buck" Conniston had been selling automobiles for the Jones-Opper

company, 2558 Farnam street, for the last three weeks.

"Conniston called me early this morning and said his sister had disappeared yesterday," said E. F. Nygaard of the company. "He asked if he could use a car to hunt for the sister. He had been hunting for her all night, he said."

"I told him he could have a used truck. He took the truck this morning. A short time later the truck was seen at Union station with several trunks on it. I went to the Union station and found Conniston and the truck there. I asked Conniston what he was doing."

**Man Disappears.**

"He replied that he was just checking out some trunks for Denver," I told him to take the truck back to the company offices, and sent another man back with him. At Sixteenth and Farnam, Conniston told the other man he wanted to see some one and left the truck. I haven't seen or heard from him since."

Conniston has been working as a salesman for various Omaha automobile concerns for the last year, according to Mr. Nygaard, who says he is a large, blond man.

Manager Stanton of the Morris apartments said that a Mr. and Mrs. Conniston had been living there since about September 1. Apparently they were a happy, ordinary couple.

"Mrs. Conniston left at the usual time yesterday morning and did not return last night, apparently," said Mr. Stanton. "Conniston checked out this morning, paying his bill. He had a truck outside in which he placed his trunks."

### Omahan Denied Readmission to U. S. From Cuba

Long Distance Phone Used by Construction Firm in Behalf of Delayed Employee.

John Peterson, 39, employe of the Edward Peterson Construction company handling a big railroad job in Cuba, is held up at the port of entry in New Orleans, denied readmission to this country and is threatened with deportation back to Cuba yesterday.

This message came yesterday to Edward Peterson, head of the firm, who is preparing to leave Sunday night for Cuba.

Efforts to reach the inspector at the port of entry by long distance telephone were made yesterday in an effort to stay deportation of the Omahan.

Peterson is held up because he claimed American citizenship when he has not his second papers, according to James H. Hanley, attorney. The latter appealed to Federal Judge Woodruff and local immigration officials to aid in straightening the case but both state they have no jurisdiction.

It must be handled from Washington, according to W. M. Brashear, but there is no time to get in touch

with Washington, before the boat returns to Cuba.

If he is not admitted in Cuba, he may be deported to Sweden, said Brashear.

**New 10,000,000-Ruble Note Will Be Issued in Russia**

Riga, Nov. 5.—"Please change this bill for me; it's only 10,000,000 rubles." This will soon be a more or less common expression in the reopening Moscow shops, according to a dispatch from the soviet capital. The council of people's commissars has decided to issue new notes of 10,000,000 rubles denomination.

This new ruble note is not as formidable as it sounds. The official soviet exchange rate enables you to get about 34,000 rubles for \$1. By exchanging your money at one of the illicit banks you can get as high as 80,000 rubles for \$1. Thus the new million-plus note is actually worth less than \$200.

**Boys Who Took Soap From Barber Shop Sentenced**

Orvil Nelson, 14, 2914 Saratoga street, and Charles Kellogg, 11, 5223 North Thirtieth street, started on a long walk to Riverview home yesterday after they explained to Judge Sears in juvenile court just how it was they came to take some soap, a blanket, and a bottle of tonic from a barber shop near Fort Omaha on October 28.

"We didn't know it belonged to anybody," they told the court. "The door was unlocked, and we just walked in."

They were sentenced to Riverview home until further order of the court.

### Holdup Murders Iowa Hotel Clerk Reaching for Gun

Holdup Enters Hostelery at 2:30 a. m. and Orders Clerk To Throw Up His Hands.

Dubuque, Ia., Nov. 5.—John Ryan, 50, night clerk in the Paris hotel, was shot and killed at 2:30 o'clock this morning by a holdup man in the hotel. When Ryan was told to throw up his hands he reached under the counter for his revolver. The robber shot him through the head and escaped.

**Two Killed in Fire.**

Wichita Falls, Nov. 5.—H. G. Henson and Walter West were killed and three men seriously injured by falling walls in a fire at Munday, Tex., early today. The entire block occupied by the Baker Campbell company was destroyed by the blaze, the origin of which has not been determined. Property loss was estimated at \$250,000.

**Railroad Wreckers Sought.**

Paducah, Ky., Nov. 5.—Illinois Central railroad detectives today are searching for two alleged train wreckers.

Howard Phenix and Ira Anderson are under arrest and the former has

confessed that the wrecking of the fast Memphis-Louisville passenger train on the night of May 23, just outside the city limits here, was the result of a plot to rob the express car of a shipment of \$100,000.

Phenix and Anderson, Paducah youths, were arrested yesterday. Phenix here and Anderson in St. Louis after detectives had worked

for almost six months on the case. Two others named by Phenix are being sought.
