Corn Producers

Would You Like to See Eigher Prices for Corn?

A CAREFUL survey of conditions leads us to believe that the most effective way of advancing the price of corn, up to at least the cost of production, is for the producers to keep back on the farms as long as possible all the corn they can properly crib, together with a reduction of corn acreage next year. However, a reduction of next year's acreage would not be profitable to the producers unless a large part of the 1921 crop is kept on the farms.

> We sincerely believe that producers generally should keep back on the farms all of the corn they can crib properly, and, if it is necessary for you to have some money advanced on your corn you can get it from the War Finance Board through your Local Bank or they can tell you how you can get it.
