Creighton Tossers Show Same Fighting Spirit of Teams of Previous Years in Iowa Game

CREIGHTON followers Thursday placed the stamp of approval squarely on Coach "Chuck" Kearney's 1922 Hill-top tossers when they took Iowa university's crack quintet into camp by a 19 to 17 score.

The game furnished Creighton's first real test, and having survived the initial one with flying colors, Creightonites are confident of a victorious season on the hardwood floor.

Even had Creighton lost, local supporters would have been well pleased with the team, for it was evident that the "fighting spirit" which has been instilled in all the teams since the famous ones of 1918 and 1919 was not missing in this year's quintet.

At the end of the first half, Iowa was on the long end of a 13 to 5 score, but in the second half Kearney's underlings called and piled up a two-point lead on their opponents which they held when the final whistle blew.

The teams will meet again tonight and another capacity crowd is expected to be on hand.

Next Monday and Tuesday night the Creightonites will clash with Colgate flippers.

J. W. It was announced following the match at Nashville, that the two would meet in the same ring January 9, but Zbyszko, after getting the match stopped on this pretense, has refused to meet a forfeit and he is not planning on filling the engagement.

Drastic Enforcement of Boxing Law to Be Made

Strict enforcement of the Nebraska boxing law will be made hereafter, John Kilmartin, boxing inspector and a member of the state boxing commission, announced this morning following a conference with Lum Doyle, head of the commission.

"The commission has been in existence long enough for all boxers, promoters and managers to be familiar with all the phases of the law," Kilmartin said, "and from now on the rules will be enforced to a dot."

Omaha matchmakers have caused the commission considerable trouble by making eleventh hour applications for boxing permits, the Omaha inspector says.

Sam McVey Dies From Pneumonia

New York, Dec. 23.—Sam McVey, negro heavyweight pugilist, died today in a local hospital, a victim of pneumonia.

The ring loses its most picturesque negro fighter in the death of Sam McVey, who was never a champion, but always a topnotcher.

Sam was 36, and his ring career began back in 1903, and lasted until 1917. He had fought several fights since then, but none of any consequence.

Sam was touted as a champion by his admirers when he was a budding boxer, but the dreams never quite materialized. His greatest fights were with Jack Johnson, Sam Langford, Harry Wills, Jeff Clark, the "fighting ghost," Denver Ed Martin, Joe Jeaneite and Jim Johnson.

In 1903 he knocked out Denver Ed Martin, then in his prime, in one round, and Jack Johnson twice in 20 rounds.

He has several kayoes over Sam Langford and the Boston Tar Baby holds several over him. His greatest fight with Langford went 43 rounds.

He fought Wills to a draw in 1915 and knocked him out in 1917 at Panama.

Prizes for City Amateur Champs

Champions in the municipal base ball association will be presented prizes at the annual banquet to be given in their honor by the directors of the Omaha Athletic club at 7 o'clock Monday night.

Members of the Drive-It-Yourself, city and class A champs, will each be given a gold base ball, and the Woodmen of the World Headquarters team, pennant winners in the class B loop, will receive a handsome trophy.

The first concerted move in preparation for the 1922 season, which promises to be the banner one in the history of amateur base ball, will be made at the banquet.

Will Form Big League Schedules At Meeting January 3
