Varsity Derby La Vinnie Captures Junior Two-Year-Old Record With 860 Pounds Of Butter.

Lincoln, Neb., Dec. 31.-Varsity Derby LaVinnie, a young Holstein cow, bred and owned by the University of Nebraska agricultural college, completed a junior 2-year-old record of 19,930.1 pounds of milk in 365 days, containing 688.43 pounds of butter fat, equal to 860.54 pounds of 80 per cent butter, according to which closed December 19.

LaVinnie approximated the record of her half sister, Varsity Deroy Sultana, present state champion, in butter production for that age; excelled Sultana by 275 pounds in milk yield and lacked but 5.16 pounds in equalling Sultana's butterfat record. La Verna Lincoln, the state charapion butterfat producer in the ma-ture class, is the mother of LaVin Her grandmother, La May. also was a state champion at on-Through both her sire and dam, LaVinnie inherits the royal producing blood of the Ormsby

LaVinnie's sire, King Derby Lincoln, was a young bull bred and owned by the university. South Dakota Rapidly Becoming Fruit State

Pierre, S. D., Dec. 31.-What South Dakota may be expected to do within the next few years as a fruit-producing state is indicated by the 1920 census report, which shows that if the 634,159 fruit trees in the state, 406,500 were of bearing age, while more than half again that number or 227,659 had not yet reached the age of fruition. The report shows there were listed 136,082 apple trees not of bearing age; 59,793 plum trees not ing age and 117,677 of bearing age and 29,563 cherry trees not of bear-ing age and 32,366 which were bear-ing. These bearing trees produced 1920, 184.265 bushels of apples; 11.861 bushels of prunes and plums offer \$100 in prizes to be distributed and 4,084 bushels of cherries.
