For Live Boys of Omaha

Omaha 'Y' Camp Lands Third Place in Western States Camp Honors

The Omaha Y. M. C. A. camp conducted last summer at Camp Sheldon, Columbus, Neb., entered the competition between all camps in the nine states of the western region, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah. The basis of the competition was the quality of program, type of leadership in charge of the boys, equipment for housing as well as mess equipment, sanitary arrangements and other vital things about a boys' camp.

The report of the judges was received this week by E. E. Micklewright, boys' work secretary of the Omaha Y. M. C. A. and director of the Omaha periods at Camp Sheldon, and Omaha received third place in the entire region for its camp last year. The judges were loud in their praise of the fine equipment at Camp Sheldon, which is said to be one of the finest boys' camps west of Chicago, and the Omaha boys received 825 points out of a possible 1,000 for their camp last year.

Great plans are being made for the Omaha camps this summer and as the camps will be limited to 100 boys instead of 150 as was the case last summer, many boys will be turned down on going to this fine trip. A thorough physical examination by a physician will also be required of boys going to camp this summer and this will raise the Omaha camps' rating considerably, as it was not done last summer.

Big Mass Meeting at 'Y' Ends the Annual Father and Son Week

Father and Son week starts in Omaha today and will be observed by over 60 different organizations, churches, men's clubs, Y. M. C. A., etc., headed by individual fathers and sons. There will be special services in over 50 churches today with special music, boys speaking for a few minutes, and special sermons by the pastors on father and son relationships.

During the week ahead there will be banquets every night in various churches. On Wednesday night there will be almost a score of banquets in as many churches, with prominent Omaha men speaking at each.

The crowning feature of the week will come next Sunday in the form of a monster mass meeting for fathers and sons, which will be held at the Y. M. C. A. under the auspices of the Omaha Father and Son committee. J. H. Beveridge, chairman of this committee, will preside and George Johnston, a senior in Central High school, will speak for the fathers. George Campbell will provide special music, high school boys will usher, and the principal talk will be given by R. B. Wallace of Council Bluffs.

Every Omaha boy over 12 years of age should plan to attend this big mass meeting and bring his father. It will be interesting, there will be good music and it will cement tighter the relations between fathers and their sons.

Banquets in Omaha Churches to Observe Father and Son Week

During the coming week many churches of Omaha will celebrate with large banquets and programs in honor of their fathers and sons. The purpose of these celebrations is to draw busy fathers and growing and energetic sons into a closer appreciation of one another.

Often times a son little realizes that his father is continually busy providing a better home and living conditions in his home—that his son might have better opportunities to fit himself for manhood.

Fathers deny themselves privileges they would like to enjoy, better clothes, etc., so that their sons may have a bicycle, skates, new clothes and good times that keeps them continually at their work.

Sons are likely to discount this and think that father doesn't care whether they have the things they need. But a little closer understanding finds that father is willing to do all that he is able to make it possible for his son to have his wants and craves a closer association. His dad will welcome an invitation to join in many of his sports and interests. From his boyhood he recalls many interesting incidents that help son over the hard places in a growing life.

Never before has the boys' division been able to secure so many annuals and catalogues of the leading schools. Many boys of the high schools are reading these and finding things of much interest and help in deciding where they want to attend college.

Special Father and Son services will be held in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium on the afternoon of Sunday, January 29, at 3 o'clock. Appropriate features are being arranged, with special music and speakers. The Hi-Y clubs of the city are promoting the meeting.

Wilmington Man Killed in Brawl; Slayer Captured

Wilmington, Del., Jan. 21.—Samuel Christina, 24, who was shot here by Ralph Oliva on one of the prominent thoroughfares, died later in a hospital. Christina and Oliva met on the street and had a noisy argument, according to pedestrians. Suddenly, spectators said, Oliva walked away, and turning quickly he drew a revolver from his pocket and shot Christina in the abdomen then fled down a side street.

More than 100 citizens followed Oliva, some of them pursuing him 12 blocks before he ran into the arms of a policeman, who subdued him.

At the police station Oliva was told his victim had died. He was held on the charge of murder. Christina refused to make a statement before he died other than Oliva fired the shot, and declined to disclose the nature of the argument.

Maxim Gorki Reported Dying in Black Forest

Berlin, Jan. 21.—Maxim Gorki may never again see his native land. This is the impression that is gaining ground among his friends and colleagues here.

Gorki came from Russia to Germany in bad physical condition to be treated at Naumburg for a complication of heart troubles. There he developed such a serious condition of the lungs and tubercular complications as to make imperative his removal to a higher and drier climate. On the advice of specialists he was taken to the sanitarium at St. Blazien in the Black Forest.

Today he is in such a weakened condition that his mail is no longer being given to him. It is said by those in close touch with him that only a long is practically gone.

The Windsor School Eighth Grade Takes Two Factory Trips

Last Wednesday morning the pupils of the Windsor eighth grade made two industrial trips under the direction of the boys' division of the Y. M. C. A. to the American Refinery and Smelters and Iden Biscuit Co.

Leaving the "Y" at 9:30 Wednesday morning the pupils liked to the American Smelters where they were interested in watching the processes of refining out first the impurities and then step by step smelting out separate ores until at last the combination of the gold and silver alone remained.

At the Iden plant the guides explained the processes of making crackers and cookies. The many delicate machines making fancy crackers and cookies were of much interest to the pupils. At the close of the trip souvenir packages of cookies were given each member of the party.

These trips are conducted every week by the boys' division of the Y. M. C. A. in co-operation with the grade schools of the city for educational purposes. Many of the schools of Omaha have during the past year been conducted through the many large Omaha industries.

Up-to-Date Mouse Makes Flights in an Airplane

Washington, Jan. 21.—Officers of the army air service chuckled over a tale from Plainfield, N. J., concerning the flight of a mouse in an airplane.

Sixteen-Shot Revolver Invented in Belgium

A Belgian concern is manufacturing a revolver, illustrated in the Popular Mechanics magazine, which enables the user to fire 16 bullets without reloading. The arm has two barrels, one above the other, registering with two series of eight holes each in the cartridge chamber. It is fitted with a double firing pin, and the bullets are fired alternately from the inner and outer circles. When all the cartridges have been discharged, the empty shells are thrown out all together by pressure on an ejector rod.
