Corn Bread

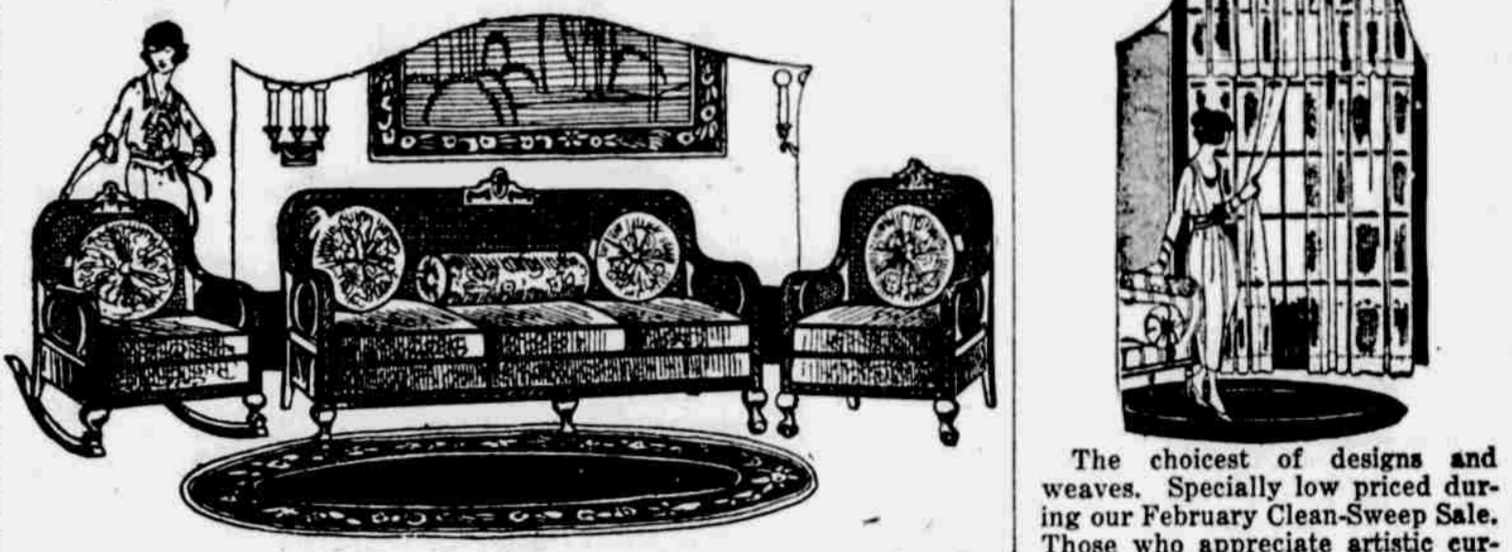
