

### Ten-Year Term of Man Accused by Girl Commuted

#### Omaha Woman, Serving for Manslaughter, Denied Parole—Joseph O'Hare Obtains Release.

Lincoln, March 7.—(Special.)—The 10-year sentence of William Sheldon of Omaha for a statutory crime was commuted today by the state board of pardons and paroles. Sheldon began serving in 1918 and shortly afterwards his brother, Robert, accompanied by the girl who testified against William, came to Lincoln to visit William. En route, it is alleged, Robert became guilty of the same crime with which William was charged, and Robert was sent to the penitentiary. He was released several months ago.

The board refused to commute the life sentence of Lafayette Dale, known as Jennie Geiger, was transported through Nebraska in 1909 and John Mann, a Keith county farmer, gave them a ride. The body of Mann was found by the side of the road. Dale and the woman were arrested at Denver. The woman has died.

#### Omaha Released.

Joseph L. O'Hare of Omaha was released on parole. He had been given from one to eight years for attempted assault. O'Hare claimed that he was the only one of four young men involved in the affair to be imprisoned.

Mrs. Mattie McNichols, serving 1 to 10 years for manslaughter, was denied a parole. Her home is in Omaha. Henry Brown, Omaha, serving life for murder, was denied a commutation. Those receiving paroles follow:

### Lion Hunter, With 36 Leo Scalps at His Belt, Dines Complacently in Lions' Den in Omaha

W. A. Westfall, Mason City, Ia., district governor of Iowa and Nebraska Lions' clubs, was guest of honor and principal speaker at the regular noon luncheon of the Omaha Lions' club at Hotel Rome yesterday.

Mr. Westfall spoke on the benefits to be derived from membership in a club such as the Lions.

"A club cannot exist without a mission and an ideal," he declared. "The Lions' club has these. It not only promotes good fellowship, and benefits the members, but it is a benefit to the community and to the nation."

Announcement was made of the district convention to be held in Omaha June 5. A special train will bring delegates and other Lions from Mason City and vicinity, Mr. Westfall said.

Another interesting speaker at yesterday's luncheon was Col. Holman James Thomas, British officer, globe-trotter and soldier of fortune. Col. Thomas is a big game hunter of note and was acquainted with the late Theodore Roosevelt. He is appearing under the name of Fred Lindsay in a whip act at the Orpheum theater.

"I have shot 37 lions," said Col. Thomas, in recounting some of his adventures with big game, "but this is the first time I have ever had the honor of lunching with the Lions club."

Col. Thomas advocates a closer unity between Americans and Englishmen and a better acquaintanceship between Americans and Britishers.

#### Eleven Sentenced to Death for Part in Manila Riot

Manila, March 7.—Eleven sergeants and corporals were sentenced to death by the supreme court yesterday for participation in a riot December 15, 1920, in which four police officers and four other persons were killed and a number wounded. The defendants had appealed from the decision of the court of the first instance, which sentenced them only to life imprisonment.

Sixty-six other defendants, enlisted constabulary, who received sentences of 17 years for their part in the murders, were sentenced by the supreme court to life imprisonment.
