Utilities Preparing to Meet Coal Strike

Every precaution is being taken by Omaha industries to prepare for the coal strike called for April 1. The Nebraska Power company and the Union Pacific railroad and other concerns have coal enough stored away to last 60 days.

The Union Pacific railroad has 850,000 tons of coal, costing more than \$3,000,000, stored in its stations. The Nebraska Power company will have 32,880 tons stored in Omaha by April 1, J. E. Davidson, general manager, said yesterday. The daily consumption of the light plant is 400 tons.

Omaha coal dealers expressed the opinion that the strike would be called.

Stewart Man Sues Railway and Claim Agent for \$25,000
