# Goal Kick After Touchdown Abolished By Rules Committee

## Any Play May Be Utilized to Score One Point

After Touchdown Attacking Side Has Possession of Ball on or Outside the Five-Yard Line.

New York, March 11.-The free trial for a goal after a touchdown was abolished today by the football rules committee. Henceforth, a team scoring a touchdown may put the ball in play on or back of the op-ponent's five-yard line and from scrimmage try for a single point by

any legal scoring play.

The rule covering the new play, which has yet to be clarified and put final form, follows:

When a touchdown has been made the side scoring the touchdown has possession of the ball anywhere on or outside the five-yard line for a scrimmage, from which by any legal play, as from an ordinary scrimmage pass, kick or run may score a field goal or touchdown and that the score of any character shall net them

one point.
"If the attacking side makes a foul or illegal or incompleted pass or other play they lose their chance for the one point following a touch-

"If the defending side offends the rules the score of one point shall be awarded to the attacking team."
